| Sawstroke | | The basic back and forth stroke |
| Long sawstroke | | Back and forth on longer notes |
| Nashville shuffle | | Basic shuffle, with slight offbeat accent |
| 3-3-2 Syncopated Patterns | | |
| Front shuffle | | Three note slur at the front of the measure |
| Middle shuffle | | Three note slur in the middle of the measure |
| Smooth shuffle | or F. S | Front + middle; second form is a common ending |
| End shuffle | | Can combine with middle shuffle |

|------------------------------|---------------------------|--|
| Ozark shuffle | T V | Starts with rag bow |
| New England shuffle | | Notice the two upbows in a row |
| French Canadian ghost bow | | Two upbows are separated by a ghost downbow |
| Georgia shuffle | | May start and end at various points |
| Long rag bow | | Could continue downbow into next measure |
| Tommy's shuffle | | Tommy Jarrell: Catch low string on 2nd note |
| Benton's shuffle | | Benton Flippen: Good start to a tune |
| Swing bow | | Swinging by pairs across the beat |
| Irish lilt | | Slurring into the beat |
| Half Measure Patterns | | |
| Snap bow | | Either first half or second half of a measure, or both |
| Rag bow | or or | A common syncopated pattern |
