


Both versions of this tune are in the key of D, using the notes in the D scale from open D up to 3rd FINGER D on the A string. Warm up with scale number 1 on page 6, and you'll be ready to play both versions. • The first

version, in 4/4 time, is the first tune in this book to feature some dotted-quarter-and-eighth-note rhythm patterns. This rhythm pattern appears several times in the tune, in measures 5 and 6 and measures 9 and 10. Review and practice this rhythm pattern by reading about it on page 5 and counting it out loud several times.


Helpful Hints


This tune, first published in 1909, originated from the Hebrides Islands off the north coast of Scotland. While it was not actually composed as wedding music, it is still very popular more than 100 years later and is often performed by Scottish bagpipers at weddings and by fiddlers in traditional sessions around the world.



Helpful Hints

This tune is in the key of D but stays on the A and E strings. You'll use every note on the E string, up to 4th FINGER B, so scale number 2 on page 6 is one you need to warm up on to prepare your fingers, particularly for LOW 2nd

FINGER and 4th FINGER on the E string. • Measures 4 and 12 of this tune have a very distinctive rhythm (with corresponding bowing) known as the "Scotch Snap." The counting is simple enough (ONE, TWO, THREE-AND FOUR), but the second eighth note of the third beat is *tied* to the final quarter note. Pull your bow quickly on the DOWN BOW and then immediately "snap" it into a long UP BOW for the tied note.
